Finance and Administration Committee Meeting - 7/21/20 - 4:00 p.m.

Present via Virtual Meeting: Chairman CH Sullivan, Mayor Justin Hanson, Alderman Keith Phelps, Alderman Jeff Morris, Alderwoman Johnetta Yarbrough, Alderwoman Minnie Bommer, Alderman Danny Wallace, Tiny Rose, Tina Dunn, David Gray, Lessie Fisher, Attorney Rachel Witherington, Chief Larry Lindsey, Chief Richard Griggs, Joseph Mack, Echo Day, Rebecca Ray

Mayor Hanson discussed funding requests. Also discussed expected revenue.

Alderman Phelps discussed funding of police vehicles. Chief Lindsey and Tina Dunn discussed costs.

Discussion of State Grant Funding – Covington Police Department

- 1st Project, Purchase of five Flock Safety Cameras for high crime areas
 - o Cost of project will be \$13,750 with additional 12-month commitment of \$12,500 for 2021
- 2nd Project, Installation of alarm and video system at Police Department Criminal Investigation Division (CID) office
 - o Relocate Property and Evidence Room to more secure location
 - o Cost will be \$8,150 and monthly monitoring fee covered by department budget funds

Motion to move forward with expenditures as amended and discussed today, 2nd, roll call, discussion, so moved.

Discussion for the sale and use of fireworks

- Fireworks were significant issue this year
 - o 121 complaint calls totaling 37 hours in call time
 - o \$4,000 in overtime to ensure sufficient coverage
- Officers assaulted with fireworks while responding to calls for service and traffic stops
- Large mortar round struck an officer in area of Wooten St.
- Separate incidents of mortar rounds fired at officer during a traffic stop
- Chief's recommendation that this Committee should take the necessary steps to outlaw the sale and use of fireworks within the city limits

Motion made to ban sale and use of fireworks within city limits, 2nd, discussion

- Special events and professionals would need to come before Board for permit
- Attorney Witherington suggested the language include the requirements for the permit and the person requesting has certain licensing and is bonded. Will research municipal codes regarding fireworks. Suggests how to deal with minors caught shooting fireworks.
- Director Fisher and Director Gray have drafted some language and will forward to Attorney Witherington.
- Chief Griggs gave stats on fireworks issues over the last 3 years, overtime, equipment, and personnel being fired upon
- Alderwoman Bonner asked about citations. Chief Lindsey did not have that info readily available. Chief will have that info by next week's Public Safety Committee meeting
- Mayor Hanson commended Committee on their work on this issue
- Motion on the floor, roll call, motion carries

Discussion on sale of vacant City property

- This is coming from last General Welfare Public Relations Committee meeting
- Director Mack discussed Anderson Field property (co-owned with Tipton County). Attorney Witherington spoke to the County.
- Attorney Witherington discussed vacant lot on Valley St.
- Need to discuss process for selling these properties
- Director Fisher discussed sandwich shop property and agreement with Farmer's Market
- Chairman Sullivan asked Alderman Morris on best way to sell property. Alderman Morris suggested putting it out to bid.
- Attorney Witherington discussed proceeds split between City and County
- Director Gray discussed sewer main that runs between fields and rectifier bed for gas line, which would have to be relocated
- Attorney Witherington stated it would be beneficial to have policy on selling large pieces of property
- Alderwoman Bonner would like to get questions answered and clarity on Main St. property and discuss at next committee meeting.
- Motion made to take request for proposals to list Valley St. property, 2nd, roll call, so moved.

Discussion on the requirement of training for a temporary beer permit

- \$250 is charged for temporary permit
- Discussed specific language for temporary permit holders, not to put additional burden on them
- Motion made to use restrictive language moving forward, 2nd, roll call, so moved

NEW COVID TESTING SITE TIMES!



Beginning Monday, July 20th, the drive-up COVID-19 testing site at the Tipton County Health Department will be giving FREE tests Monday - Friday, **8:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m.** The Tennessee National Guard is on hand to administer the tests. You can drive through and get your free test regardless of symptoms. Tipton County Health Department is located at 4700 Mueller Brass Rd.



The Tennessee Pledge was developed by Governor Lee, the Unified Command Group (UCG) and Tennessee's Economic Recovery Group (ERG) with input from health experts, state and local partners and business and industry leaders. It includes specific recommendations which enable most businesses to reopen responsibly without the burden of heavy mandates. This will be a gradual process, with room to adjust as data is evaluated. Crestview Elementary School Reopening Plan

The reopening plan for Tipton County was presented and approved during the School Board meeting Thursday, July 9th, 2020. A **staggered schedule** for students desiring face – to – face learning opportunities will begin on August 17th and will continue through the **first three weeks of school**. An alternative distance learning opportunity will also be available.

Parents and Students: The first step you must complete is whether you want to enroll in the face-to-face learning opportunity at school or to enroll in the distance learning opportunity. Your decision will be informed during the online enrollment/registration process, which opened on Wednesday, July 15th and concludes on July 31st. Information on how to complete this enrollment process on Family Access/Skyward was provided with the report card distribution. All students must complete this process to be enrolled in Crestview Elementary School. **If you do not have internet access or need help with the online registration process, you can go to the Central Office July 28th from 3:00pm – 7:00pm. CES will be open on July 29th from 8:00am – 3:00pm and July 30th from 8:00 am – 7:00pm.**

At CES, the face-to-face staggered schedule will be the following:

Students with a last name beginning with A-K will attend on Monday and Wednesday.

Students with a last name beginning with L-Z will attend on Tuesday and Thursday.

Fridays will be used for intervention/remediation and will be individually scheduled depending on need. Your child's teacher will contact you if this is needed for your child.

We have worked with CIAA, CMS and CHS to ensure that blended families all have the same two days assigned.

If there are multiple last names within a family but they all fit with the A-K or L-Z division, then they will attend on the appropriate days. (Example: If the student last names are Barnes and Davidson are within the same family, the family would attend Monday and Wednesday; if the student last names Moore and Smith are within one family, the family would attend on Tuesday and Thursday.

If there are multiple last names within a family and they fall in BOTH the A-K and L-Z division, then the schools have assigned these families and you will receive a phone call from your child's teacher to alert you of the days assigned for your family (Example: if the student last names Barnes and Moore within one family, the family will be assigned by the school and will receive a phone call the week of August 3rd-7th).

The students of CES will meet all scheduled classes on each day they attend for the first three weeks of school. Students attending on Monday/Wednesday will see their teacher(s) twice a week. This is true for the Tuesday/Thursday group as well. Extended learning opportunities will be provided for the days they are NOT in attendance. All work will be required and will be used for the student's grade.

Because we have worked to ensure a balance of students within our building during each two-day staggered schedule, we will NOT be able to adjust assigned days for your student.

Covington High School Information for Re-Entry

July 16, 2020

During the 2020-2021 school year, students have two options: to attend school on campus or virtually through distance learning. In addition, we will begin the year on a staggered schedule (more information below). For students who attend on campus, we will be using a blended learning strategy of classroom instruction along with virtual learning on days when not on campus. Packets will be provided to students with no online access. An alternative distance learning opportunity is also available for those who do not want to attend on campus. The distance learning option will require devices (other than a cell phone) with reliable internet access. Parents must decide whether you will enroll your student in classroom instruction on campus or the distance learning off campus. You will choose between the two during the online enrollment/registration process.

Parents must complete this between now and July 31st. **ALL STUDENTS MUST COMPLETE THIS PROCESS.**

Safety

We will be taking the temperature of every student before they enter the building. There will be only 3 entry points into the building (MAIN ENTRANCE, GYM HALLWAY, BAND HALLWAY). Students will follow a four class schedule to limit contacts. There will be a school nurse on site every day. Only students, faculty, and essential personnel will be allowed to enter the building.

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW:

Registration / Enrollment dates- Now thru July 31st

Students with last name beginning with A-K will attend on Monday and Wednesday.

Students with last name beginning with L-Z will attend on Tuesday and Thursday.

Last name A-K: first day is Aug. 17th

Last name L-Z: first day is Aug. 18th

If you have students with different last names that fall into different schedules, then your students will follow the schedule of the oldest sibling. Ex. (oldest sibling has the last name Alexander and attends CHS and younger sibling has the last name of Washington and attends CES, CMS, or CIAA.) Your students would follow the scheduled days for the oldest sibling.

At CIAA, the face-to-face staggered schedule will be:

Students with a last name beginning with **A - K** will attend on **Monday and Wednesday**.

Students with the last name beginning with **L - Z** will attend on **Tuesday and Thursday**.

Fridays will be used for intervention/remediation and will be individually scheduled depending on need.

We have worked with our elementary, middle & high school feeder schools to ensure that blended families all have the same two days assigned.

If there are multiple last names within a family but they all fit with the A-K or L-Z division, then attend on the appropriate days.

(Example: If the student last names Barnes and Davidson are within one family, the family would attend Monday and Wednesday; if the student last names Moore and Smith are within one family, the family would attend Tuesday and Thursday)

If there are multiple last names within a family and they fall in BOTH the A-K and L-Z division, then the schools have assigned these families and YOU will receive a phone call from one of the schools to alert you of the days assigned for your family. (Example: if the student last names are Barnes and Moore within one family, the family will be assigned and will receive a phone call) You will receive this phone call the week of July 27- 31, 2020.

Because we have worked to ensure a balance number of students within our building during each two-day staggered schedule, we will NOT be able to adjust assigned days for your student.



As parents, teachers, and administrators continue to be concerned about re-entry into the schools this Fall, the Tipton County School Board met to discuss and decide on a plan for the start of the school year.

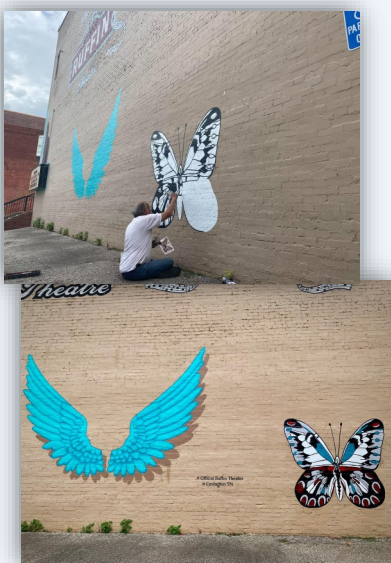

Despite continued uncertainty, we have once again been made aware that our local economy remains strong --- thanks to **YOU!** On Monday, we received our monthly local option sales tax report and we are happy to report sales tax numbers from May 2020 as compared to May 2019 are **UP 11.9%** (\$40,000). That puts the City of Covington's year to date local option sales tax up 4.3% (\$148,000).

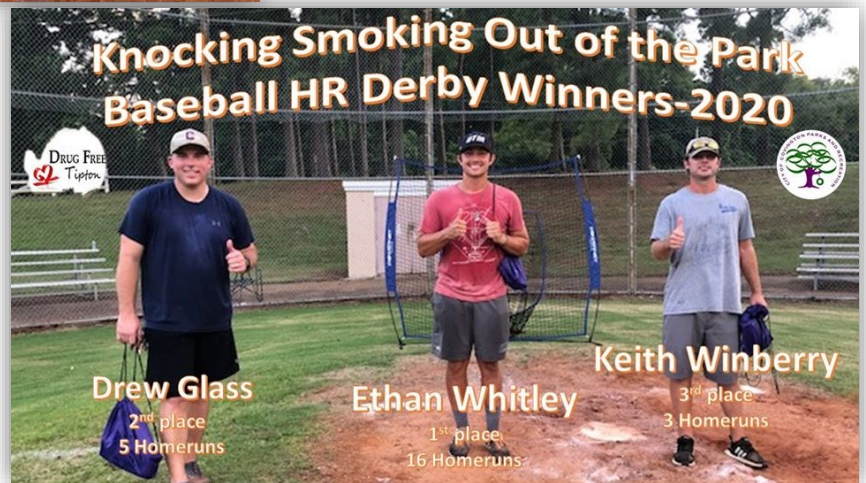
COVINGTON TIPTON COUNTY CHAMBER of COMMERCE
